Now let's turn to jobs to do in the garden and allotment this month –

1.Continue planting bulbs for Spring displays to brighten up the garden after the winter months.

 2. Cut back herbaceous perennials as the foliage dies off but leaving a few dead stems to protect the plant.
 3. Clear out borders that are to be replanted using a fork rather than a spade on heavier soil.

4. After the first frost lift dahlia tubers or cover with deep mulch.

5.Leaves are now falling rapidly – continue to rake up for the compost bin,

6. Plant bare-root raspberry canes for summer picking whilst Autumn varieties will start cropping in August and continue until the frosts appear.
7. Net up brassicas to prevent the pigeons from having a feast.

# **DID YOU KNOW?**

The last Sunday before Advent is known as "Stir-Up Sunday" the day when traditionally families would gather together to prepare the Christmas Pudding! However, this day does not get its name from "stirring the pudding", it actually gets its name from the Common Book of Prayer where the Collect of the day for the last Sunday before Advent starts: "Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord, the wills of thy faithful people". However, since Victorian times is has become associated with the endearing family custom of preparing for Christmas together by making the Christmas pudding. Does this custom still exist these days one wonders!

### RECIPE OF THE MONTH BRAMLEY APPLE AND BLACKBERRY CRUMBLE WITH A NUTTY BROWN SUGAR TOPPING Pre-heat oven to 1800 Gas Mark 4

### **INGREDIENTS**

6 large Bramleys - peeled, cored & sliced 400g blackberries 2tsp lemon juice & 1tsp lemon zest 2 tbsp runny honey 200g plain flour 150g light brown sugar 150g butter 150g oats Pinch of sea salt 100g hazelnuts & 100g walnut pieces

# METHOD

Put the prepared apples into a baking dish (preferably the one you will use to bake the crumble in) Spoon over the honey, lemon juice and zest and toss gently. Bake for about 15 minutes. Meanwhile put the flour, sugar and butter into a bowl and rub the butter in with your fingertips until it looks like coarse breadcrumbs. Stir in the oats, walnuts and hazelnuts and add a pinch of salt. Stir to combine. Add the blackberries to the apples then spread the crumble mixture on top. Put the crumble back into the oven to bake for about 30 minutes. Flick a little water over the top of the crumble to stop it burning but check a few times and cover with some foil if the topping starts to blacken. Take out of the oven and enjoy with yoghurt, crème fraiche, ice cream or custard!
