Let's turn to a few gardening tips

1.Start planning autumn planting and ordering plants and bulbs.

2. Apply top dressings to lawns evenly into the top few inches of soil and then rake to leave a level surface.

3. Plant out well grown perennial seeds into nursery beds and water them. These should be ready for planting out in their final positions either during the autumn or early spring.

4. Sow seeds of spring cabbage, lettuce and Brussel Sprouts

5. Pick loganberries when perfectly ripe.

6. Plant rooted Strawberry runners to ensure a good crop next year.

# RECIPE OF THE MONTH HONEY CAKE AND HONEY BISCUITS

for the Cake pre-heat oven to 180c Gas Mark 4 for the cake and grease & flour a square cake tin

for the Biscuits pre-heat the oven to 190c for 15 minutes and grease a baking tray

#### **INGREDIENTS FOR THE CAKE**

1 egg 1/2 cup of sugar 150g honey cinnamon to taste 1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda 2 cups of flour, sifted 50g blanched almonds

# METHOD

Beat the egg and sugar together. Then add the honey, spice and bicarbonate of soda. Gradually fold in the sifted flour. Pour into the prepared cake tin and bake for 15-20 minutes. minutes. Turn out on to a wire rack and when cool the cake can be cut into two halves and filled with jam.

### **INGREDIENTS FOR THE BISCUITS**

4 eggs 2 cups of sugar 500g honey ½ tsp vanilla essence 1kg flour 2 tsp bicarbonate of soda ¼ tsp cinnamon ¼ nutmeg Icing sugar and cinnamon

### METHOD

Beat eggs and sugar until thick. Add honey and vanilla and mix well. Sift flour, cinnamon and nutmeg and fold into the mixture until the dough is stiff then set aside covered for 24 hours. Roll out onto a flat sheet and cut into shapes or roll up tightly and cut into widths 10-15mm thick. Bake in the prepared tin and pre-heated oven for 15 minutes. Dust with icing sugar and cinnamon. **ENJOY!**
