pID YOU KNOW? - January was highly significant in medieval superstitions regarding prosperity or lack of it, in the year ahead. One tradition was to put a flat cake on one of the horns of a cow in every farmyard. The farmer and his workers would then sing and dance around the cow until the cake was thrown to the ground. If it fell in front of the cow, that signified good luck, to fall behind indicated the opposite. One wonders whether this tradition is still carried on but in the current climate perhaps it would not be such a good idea!

BIRTHDAY and ANNIVERSARY greetings to all those members with a birthday or anniversary this month.

Now let's turn to jobs for the garden and allotment this month with hopefully the weather turning a bit brighter to make gardening more fun!

- 1. Wash out pots and plastic trays.
- 2.During mild spells firm up soil around plants loosened by frost and prepare new beds.
- 3. Mend any pergolas and other wooden structures as necessary.
- 4. Order veg and flower seeds to grow this year.
- 5. Plant bare-root roses, fruit trees, bushes and canes.
- 6. Sow sweet peas for summer in a heated propagator or indoors.
- 6. Sow broad beans
- 7.Plant shallots in well-drained soil.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH EGGLESS ORANGE SPONGE

Swiss roll tin greased Pre-heat oven to 180oC

INGREDIENTS FOR SPONGE

150g / 5oz wholewheat flour 1 tsp baking powder 100g / 3½oz butter, softened 100g / 3½oz soft brown sugar ½ orange, finely grated, juice strained 12.5 cl / 4 fl oz of milk

INGREDIENTS FOR NO-SUGAR ICING

100g / 3½oz coconut cream grated 2tbs boiling water 2tbs honey

METHOD

Sift together the flour and baking powder. Cream the butter and sugar, then gently add the sifted ingredients and the orange rind alternately with the milk and orange juice; if the mixture looks lumpy beat it well and it will smooth out again. Spread into the prepared Swiss roll tin and bake in the oven for 25 minutes or until golden. Cool the sponge in the tin.

TO MAKE THE ICING

Mix the coconut cream, water and honey. Stir until creamy. Pour the icing over the sponge. Cut the cake into fingers when the icing has set. ENJOY!
